Safeguarding Health Care – ICRC’s Prime Objective

ISLAMABAD: As a nation more equal health care is a basic right of every citizen. The importance of adoption of multidisciplinary approach towards increasing protection of Health Care was stressed upon by the hon’ble senior practitioners and reports in the session on Safeguarding Health Care. The session was organized by International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) and Health Services Academy during 12th Annual Public Health Conference of Health Services Academy.

The session was facilitated by Health Care in Danger (HCD) initiative of ICRC, a dedicated program aimed at combating violence against health care. This violence against doctors, nurses, ambulance drivers, paramedics, and health systems can disrupt the health-care system when people need it the most.

Dr. Zia Ul Haq, VC Khayber Medical College was the chief guest of the session, while Director Emergency Department, Lady Reading Hospital, Dr. Haroon Sheikh, Prof. VC Jamia University, Prof. Dr. Umar Ali Khan, Associate Professor HSA, Dr. Aijaz Ahmad, Associate Professor HSA, Dr. Samina Naeem Khalid, Former ED, PSH South, Head of HCD Initiative Dr. Mirza Khan, and Project Manager HCD, Dr. Faraz Health spoke at the session.

Head of HCD Initiative, Dr. Mirza Khan, said that this demonstration was his widespread and long-term effects. We all need to address it together. He explained that the HCD/HCD approach consists of



strengthening evidence base, morphing knowledge and evidence into practical interventions and advocacy tools and promoting awareness regarding respect and protection of health care. Associate Professor, HSA, Dr. Samina Naeem Khalid said that threat to health care practically leads to halt in institutions, jeopardizing the whole health system. She stressed on the need of enhancing trust and respect for healthcare by being the effective role models and advisors to use. The first have steps of change to be taken about behavioral change in masses through media. Project Manager, HCD, Dr. Faraz Health enlightened the audience on findings of the review of provincial legal frameworks, overview of enactment of amendments and new procedural law for protection of health care and dissemination of legal provisions for protection of healthcare. Dr. Zia ul Haq, VC Khayber Medical College expressed his concerns regarding safeguarding health care and described potential threat to them especially in the situation of crisis in Pakistan. He said that during crises many people die only because they are prevented from receiving medical attention in time. Entire communication is cut off from vital services, such as maternity care, childcare and vaccinations. Sometimes the situation can be so severe that the entire system collapses. In the best time that we all join hands to address this issue of government and ensure safety of health care.

People of Marjhand (Jamshoro) start returning to work

ISLAMABAD: After completing a ‘rapid infrastructure rehabilitation’ Project for the flood-affected people in Thana Orak, Balochistan, ILO supports the Government of Pakistan in rolling out emergency employment project now in Jamshoro-Sindh. The project will be delivered through Pakistan Workers Federation and will generate around 5,000 person days of employment for the people of Marjhand.

Sindh and Balochistan are among the provinces which are hardest hit by the devastating floods of 2022. In a rapid assessment done by the ILO, 50 per cent employment is lost or disrupted in Sindh, leaving all other provinces. This employment disruption and loss is mostly in agriculture sector and other informal parts of the economy. Women working in the agriculture sector are further disadvantaged because of the floods.

Mr. Sajid Hussain Durr, Federal Minister for Overseas Pakistanis and HRD, looked for the ILO for its immediate response to the crisis caused by the floods saying, rapid infrastructure rehabilitation is not only a means to injecting cash by bringing people back to work but also a way of ensuring that dignity of people is respected in the process of recovery and reconstruction.

The rapid infrastructure reconstruction project, launched in Marjhand Jamshoro is a small drop in the ocean, but a project that is scalable and can be implemented through an integrated approach that provides health, education, social services, and protection to people along with daily wages for the work they carry out, commented Mr. Mansoor Khalid, ILO Officer in charge for CO Pakistan. The project will ensure that employment opportunities created are in line with international labour standards and that no children are engaged in labour and women and men are provided equal opportunities.

Secretary Welfare Welfare Board Mr. Saib Jumaani, ILO Officer in charge for CO Pakistan, Mr. Mansoor Khalid, Mr. Waqar Memon, Pakistan Workers Federation joined the Federal Minister for Overseas Pakistanis and HRD during his community visit where they met with those who have been registered with the emergency employment project and girls and boys who are enrolled with the non-formal education centres organised in the community.

Explaining to the guests visiting the community of Marjhand, Mr. Asad Memon, PWF, said that women in Sindh have indigenous skills and we are leveraging these by helping them make rattes and other local products and they will be assisted in making market linkages so these products can be sold.
